17. Narrative analysis II – analysis

In the Writing Development exercise #14 on African Americans and Women in WWII, we looked at how to write a narrative, viz.:

- a) Plan out the events/developments you intend to describe, in the logical order, using subordinating conjunctions of time/sequence such as: 'First', 'Next', 'After', 'Before', 'Later', 'Initially', 'At last', 'Also', 'In addition', 'Meanwhile', 'Simultaneously', 'Furthermore'.
- b) Provide some relevant factual information about the event/development.

Better essays, however, will ANALYSE the story as they tell it, by:

- c) explaining the importance of the event/development why it was a key event in the narrative.
- d) providing information which proves that importance.

Let's say you have to write the essay: "Write a narrative account analysing the legal achievements of the Civil Rights Movement, 1945-65."

Consider the following table, which lists the achievements:
