1. Fragments and Sentences I

Starting at the very beginning, do you know the difference between a 'fragment' and a 'sentence'?

1. In the following, which are the fragments and which are the sentences?

- during the Second World War, Britain and America were allies of Russia
- shows the Atomic Bomb looming threateningly over the peace-makers
- it lasted until 1989
- the author George Orwell famous for his book 1984
- it tried to offer sensible and unbiased judgements on events
- politicians realised that the bomb would change international politics
- a divided world where nuclear weapons had made nations unconquerable

2. Convert the fragments into sentences in the simplest way possible.

If you found Tasks 1&2 difficult, or did not know how to distinguish between a 'fragment' and a 'sentence', go to your English teacher and ask them to explain. How can you expect to write a good essay if you do not even know what a 'sentence' is?
