The Writing Development exercises here are adapted from her programme.

14. Conjunctions V – First, Next, After, Before, Later, Initially, At last, Also, In addition, Meanwhile, Simultaneously, Furthermore, Finally

(If you do not want your essay to sound like Primary School, avoid the word 'then'!)

Narrative is a key historian's skill. To write the simplest narratives, you must:

- a) Plan out the sequence of events/developments you intend to describe, in their best logical order.
- b) Use that list to 'tell the story', using the most appropriate conjunctions of time and sequence (above).
- c) Provide some relevant information about each event/development.
- 1. Using the skills you rehearsed in Exercise 13, make your own timeline from <u>the webpage</u> of the story of the League of Nations 1936-39 ie AFTER the disaster of Abyssinia.

Scan-read down the page, finding the relevant dates mentioned, and jot them down, with a short note as to what happened, so as to complete the following table:
