WRITING DEVELOPMENT

Making notes is a skilled task, develops over years, and everyone has their own variant! Exs 5, 8, 12 & 13 in this unit are a brief intro. The best way to learn this skill, however, is to do it; every page you study should be read with a pencil and notebook by your side. PS research has shown the hand-WRITING the notes 'fixes' the information in your brain better than typing or highlighting.

8. Making Notes II -- Abbreviations

On the right, you can see a list of common historian's abbreviations. As time goes on, you will change some and add your own, but go with these for the moment.

The <u>pdf notes</u> on the webpage on Post-War Treaties: Achievements & Defects use many these abbreviations.

- 1. Go through the pdf notes, identifying all the occasions they have used an abbreviation from the list. See how the notes have used it, comparing the notes to the full-out text on the <u>webpage</u>. Notice how the notes also miss out unnecessary words (eg 'The Treaty of Versailles' becomes: ToV).
- 2. Re-write the following paragraph in note form, making as much use as possible of the abbreviations on the right:

"The fact that the Treaty of Versailles was a *diktat* reduced its legitimacy. For example, in Germany, hatred rose to fever-pitch, especially because of the reparations sum of $\pounds 6.6$ billions (even though, as regards repayments, this was less per annum than Britain had to repay to the USA).

"This, along with fury that they had lost land; that they had been left without an army against enemy aggression; the 'war guilt' clause and other grievances, led to the growth of fascism and arguably, therefore, the Second World War."

Possible solution at bottom of page.

- 3. Practise making abbreviated notes on relevant passages in your textbook.
- 4. Start making use of the abbreviations in your own note-taking.

NOTE: when you start doing this, you may find it very difficult and timeconsuming. PERSEVERE ... as you get better, it will save you loads of time.
