Explain pick-up

How serious was the Great Depression of the 1930s?

This revision activity works best if you do it with a friend, and talk about it as you do it.

The cards below all describe something that happened during the Great Depression in America.

Cut up the cards and place them face down. In turn, pick up a card, explain how it affected America and Americans, and how much, then place it face up in one of two piles – those which suggest the Depression was all doom and gloom, and those which suggest things were not all bad.

When you have finished 'weigh up' the two piles - how serious was the Great Depression?
