- 6 A grocer whose business has been ruined by the Jewish-owned department store next door
- 7 A demobbed soldier who can't find a job
- 8 An impressionable young woman who has attended a Nazi rally
- 9 A German nationalist who thinks the Treaty of Versailles was unfair
- 10 A Protestant minister who thinks that homosexuality is wrong
- 11 A right-wing judge who misses the Kaiser
- 12 A policeman sick of weak and chaotic government
- 13 A young boy who loves going to the Hitler Youth
- 14 A poor person harmed by Brüning's cuts to social benefits
- 15 A member of the Wandervogel movement
- 16 A teacher harmed by Brüning's cut to public workers' pay
- 17 A man who has just been beaten up by Nazi storm troopers
- 18 Someone who thought Stresemann's foreign policy was a sell-out to America
- 19 A rich landowner worried that the Communists will confiscate his land
- 20 A poor farmer, struggling against foreign competition
